Project 2010 is underway!

With an interesting mix of good luck and hard work NHOH Project 2010 is off to a good start. For those of you who did not attend the NHOH membership meeting at the Tre Lag Stevne in August, let me tell you a little bit about this new NHOH initiative and the jump-start it's had in the intervening weeks.

The earliest US organization of immigrants from the Hedmark area of Norway was called Østerdalslaget. This group held its first meeting in Fergus Falls, Minnesota in 1910. In the mid 1900s, as members grew older and subsequent generations found less interest in their heritage, the Østerdalslaget folded.

In 1995 - in response to a renewed curiosity about heritage - a new US organization of descendants of immigrants from the northern 2/3 of the Østerdal Valley was formed. Because this new organization covered a slightly larger geographic area in Norway - we took a new name: *Nord Hedmark og Hedemarken Lag*.

If the original organization had survived, Østerdalslaget would be celebrating it's 100th anniversary in 2010. In recognition of that Centennial, the Nord Hedmark og Hedemarken Lag is undertaking a research and outreach project to identify descendants of the founding members of Østerdalslaget.

Our mission is two fold:

1. To advance research on the immigration and settlement of Østerdal families in the US and elsewhere.
2. By identifying Østerdal descendants, to spark an interest among Hedmark descendants who are unaware of the specifics of their Norwegian ancestry and, in the process, to grow the membership of Nord Hedmark og Hedemarken Lag.

Project 2010 will culminate with a Centennial celebration at our Stevne in 2010 in which living descendants of Østerdalslaget's charter members will be invited to join us to honor the role their immigrant ancestors played in our history.

To kick off the project, we have published the earliest known list (1913) of Østerdalslag members on our website at www.nhohlag.org (follow the Project 2010 link).



(President Dixie's letter continued)

Just a few days after it was posted, the first piece of "good luck" came in!



I received an email from Morten Undseth, of Oslo Norway on September 19th. Morten explained that he discovered the name of his great-grandmother's eldest brother, Lars Lomnæs (a St. Paul resident from Rendalen) on the 1913 membership list which was posted on our



Lomnes Family

Lars Eriksen Lomnæs and Kristine Ingebretsdatter Bolstad immigrated with their 5 children to the U.S. from Rendalen in Hedmark Norway in 1882. They settled first in St. Croix County, Wisconsin. Around 1900 the family trickled into Saint Paul, Minnesota and eventually 4 of the children (Erick, Andrew, Inga, and Leon) then went on to Skagit Co., Washington.

website. He has further information on the Norwegian branch of the family and wondered if it would be possible to find some of his living relatives in the United States. Morten wrote that he even had an 1887 photograph of the family of Lars and Christine Lomnæs taken at a studio in Hudson Wisconsin which had been sent back to their family in Norway 121 years ago.

I took that inquiry from Norway as a good omen – and as a perfect opportunity to attempt to connect a living descendant in the United States with a pair of charter lag members of Østerdalslag – but also (and this is half the fun, isn't it?) to put them in touch with "ready-made" and interested kin in Norway. A three-fer!

Thus began the research... which (starting with a basic sketch-out from the 1900 through 1930 online US census records) went amazingly fast. In short-order, with online help, I located researcher, Dierdre Duewel, a Lomnæs relation through a non-charter line, who had lots of information on the family and who clued me in on the fact that our fellow Trelager (Trønderlag member, Nancy Hawkinson) had done some concentrated research on the Hudson connections of the Lomnæs family. With the great help of these two researchers, I was able to lay in a good chunk of the first 3 US generations of the Lomnæs/Lomnes family. But (in a family that was startlingly non-prolific) I had not yet nailed down a link to a 4th generation living relative.

That missing link turned up when I made a visit to Oakland Cemetery, near my home in St. Paul. My goal was to find the married name of Alpha "Corine" Twetley, who I had discovered to be a grand-daughter of charter members Lars and Christine Lomnæs. The last record I had of Corine was a 1946 newspaper article I had googled up which announced her appointment as an assistant professor of speech at Bucknell University. She was single and 35 at that time. Then no further sign of her.

I walked into the cemetery office and said that I was looking for the graves of Lars and Christine Lomnes, Corine's grandparents – who I knew to be there – and possibly the graves of her parents, Bernhard and Mary Twetley, whose death/burial location I didn't yet know.

And this is where the astounding part comes in: From memory (I kid you not!) the lady at the desk in the cemetery office told me that 1. she knew where the Lomnes graves were. 2. yes, the Twetley's were buried next to them, that 3. "the daughter" – last name "Frevert" was not buried at Union, but she was no longer living, and that 4. "give me a minute, I'll come up with it," [long pause] "there's a Colorado connection... yes, I remember... his name is Don... Don Frevert." Now this feat of memory would not be so astounding if Union Cemetery were just a small church plot – but this non-secular cemetery covers 100 acres and is home to 48,000 burials!! Wow, huh? My new best friend (!) then checked a couple of cemetery burial databases and confirmed that her memory was right on the money.

Genealogical pursuit is full of little miracles leaps like that... and, with that missing link, it took only a little further google work to locate an email address for

Don Frevert, who is with the US Bureau of Reclamation in Lakeland, Colorado. After that it took several days of patient waiting on my part for Don to get back from vacation and answer the email. Finally the communication came. **The Don Frevert I had emailed confirmed that he was, indeed, a great-grandson of Østerdalslag charter members, Lars and Christine Lomnæs.**

Because Don's mother was raised as an only child (she had 2 half-sibs who died in infancy) and because Don's maternal grandparents died before he was born, he actually knew very little about the Lomnes side of his family. But he did have some helpful notes that he made in the 1990s when he talked to his mother about her roots. Don also reported that, in 1967, as a teenager, he visited the Rendal area of Norway with his parents, and remembered meeting a "Kværnes" cousin there. I'll be doing some follow-up with him to nail a few things down further.

So, I am happy to this first outreach effort of Project 2010 has been a success. Morten Undseth, of Oslo Norway has been connected with his 3rd cousin, Don Frevert, of Lakeland, Colorado. Don, in turn, knows quite a lot more about his maternal roots than he knew previously... and even has photographs (supplied by Morten) of his great-great grandfather and a group photo of the family of his great-grandparents. And NHOH has tracked and recorded a 3-generation history of one of Østerdalslaget's earliest members (posted online at a link you'll find on the 2010 project page of www.nhohlag.org).

That's 2 down. Next?!

Project 2010 is looking for volunteers. What can you do to help?

Review the 1913 membership list (posted at www.nhohlag.org) which includes the name, community of origin, and the 1913 place of residence of Østerdalslag's earliest members.

If you're a descendant of one of these early members (or know someone who is) email a set of 3 (or 4) generation family group sheets (or, better yet, a gedcom file) to Dixie Hansen at pres@nhohlag.org. Don't have email? Mail to: 1411 Osceola Ave, St. Paul, MN.

Pick out any name or married couple on the 1913 list and volunteer to dig in and do the research to bring at least one line of that member forward to the current generation. Maybe this is a family that's related to you or that came from the same community your ancestor came from – or maybe they lived in an area near where you live now (giving you easier access to research materials).

Or perhaps you just like the name! We don't want to duplicate efforts, so – once you choose a name to work on... let webmaster, Bob Christensen know that you're "on it." His email is : webperson@nhohlag.org. He'll add your name to the "researcher" column of the member chart.

Troll through published material that may already have been done on some of these early NHOH families and extract and submit to the project the information needed to bring them forward to the current generation. For instance, there are many potentially useful genealogical snippets included in the 1938 volume of *Østerdølenes Saga* (see separate article on the upcoming "searchability" of this book) and books like Vidar Støen's volume *Utvandrerhistorie for Follidal* trace selected Hedmark families forward in the US. We need to take advantage of research that's already been done.

If you like data entry, but can't/don't want to do the research yourself, volunteer to take submitted family group sheets and enter them into the genealogy program of your choice (*If you'll mail us the file, we'll take care of converting it to the format we need for posting on the web*).

Serve in a "making contact" role. Some of us are better at telephone work than others (I'm not one who is) but Trønderlag (who just completed a similar project for their Centennial) reported that making that direct phone contact with discovered descendants resulted in much better cooperation in getting them to submit ancestral biographies and photos and information about current generations than either letters or email did. They found that the personal touch was key and that, often, someone who wasn't too interested in their heritage, if encouraged, would make the referral to a sibling or cousin who was. If you would be willing to assist in the research by making some of those follow-up "we found you" calls, let me know.

Østerdølenes Saga – Scanning and Indexing Project

In 1938, K.G. Nilsen, President of Østerdalslag, published a 517-page history of the organization – which includes thousands of names of US immigrants from north Hedmark – often with little bits and chunks of biographical and genealogical information. Although it's written in Norwegian, much of the material is in list-form or brief, and not too hard to decipher by someone (like me) who is encumbered with English-only proficiency. The challenge with it, however, is that the pages are densely packed and the book is not indexed. In book form, it's only searchable by flipping through pages manually looking for a familiar name.

Because *Østerdølenes Saga* will definitely prove to be a valuable resource for Project 2010 (see *Hilsen Fra Presidenten* column) and because I know that that many of our members will find useful family information in this book, I've begun scanning computer images of every page of the book. As of today, I've completed 67% of the pages. It's slow going. But the text is reasonably crisp and with a little hand-clean-up and the use of some powerful text-recognition software (that even knows Norwegian!), the first indication is that I'll be able to convert the scanned images of the pages into editable text. If that proves out, we'll soon be able to post this volume online as a fully searchable PDF file... making look-ups of names and places much easier. The conversion to editable text will also make it feasible to build an index with far less manual labor than a hand-indexing project would entail.

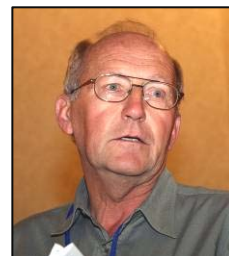

Focus on NHOH Member.... Orrin Helstad

Orrin was born on a farm in the French Creek valley northwest of the village of Ettrick in Trempealeau County, Wisconsin. He considered that area to be his home for the first 20 years of his life. Although the area was called French Creek, there was not a Frenchman in sight. At least in the northern part of the valley where he grew up, everyone was a descendant of immigrants from Norway. His paternal grandparents and maternal grandfather came from an area near Brumundal on the east side of Lake Mjosa. His maternal grandmother called herself a Lanning, so he assumes her family came from an area on the west side of Lake Mjosa. He has not yet traced her family background.

Norwegian was the language used on the farms in the area where he grew up, and so it also became his first language. By the time he entered their rural grade school, he had learned enough English so he could get along. However, during recess, conversations on the playground would quickly return to the local Norwegian dialect they were accustomed to using at home. During each summer, there was a month of "Norwegian school" taught by a lady from the neighborhood. The purpose was to teach them to read enough Norwegian so that they could study with the Lutheran minister ("læse for presten") with the objective of being confirmed using the Norwegian language. Orrin's confirmation class of 1936 probably was one of the last to have any

confirmands using the Norwegian language, and he was one of those confirmands.

After graduating from Blair High School in 1940, he spent two years at La Crosse State Teachers College (now the University of Wisconsin – La Crosse). By that time, they were engaged in World War II. Because of Orrin's poor eyesight, he did not get into service, but instead spent most of the next four years working in a paper mill and box factory in Milwaukee. He returned to school in the fall of 1946, this time at the University of Wisconsin in Madison where he received his undergraduate and law degrees. The first 11 years of his professional career was with the State of Wisconsin Legislative Council, where he spent most of his time working on major law revision projects. In 1961 he got the opportunity to join the faculty of the University of Wisconsin Law School. He spent the next 29 years there, including three years as Associate Dean and eight years as Dean.

Orrin's life-long passion for old-time dance music and dancing, stem from exposure at an early age. During the 1920's, there were frequent neighborhood house parties that included dancing. There was no shortage of local musicians with fiddles and accordions, including some of his mother's cousins. A few years later, the parties moved into the local one-room schoolhouses. A major benefit of his passion for dancing occurred in the early 1950's when he met his future wife Charlotte Ankeney at a folk dance. Charlotte did not have any Norwegian ancestry, except perhaps a trace through Viking who settled in northern France, but she was very adaptable to his interests and idiosyncrasies and would proudly wear a button that read "Norwegian by marriage" when they attended events such as a lutefisk dinner. Of course, she also served as Treasurer of NHOH Lag for a number of years and enjoyed attending the Lag's stevner.

Although Orrin never lost interest in his Norwegian heritage, it waned for a number of years while he was concentrating on his professional career. Interest resumed in 1968 with a trip to Norway, the first of five such trips. In 1978 he joined the Madison Ygdrasil Literary Society and enjoyed researching and writing a number of papers on Norwegian-American subjects. In the summer of 1997, Orrin saw a story in the local newspaper regarding the proposed organization of a bygdelag relating to the Hedmark area of Norway. He attended the meeting and became "hooked." He served on the board of directors for a number of years and has attended every annual stevne so far.

Orrin looks forward to the next one.

Wergeland hailed on 200th birthday



Henrik Wergeland, viewed by many as one of the most important founding fathers of the modern Norwegian state, may be long gone but he's certainly not forgotten.

Henrik Wergeland's memory lives on, 200 years after his birth. A

statue of Wergeland was mounted in downtown Oslo as early as 1881.

Wergeland would have turned 200 on Tuesday, and a year of celebrations started to climax early in the morning. Admirers began assembling before 9 am near his grave in the national cemetery downtown, and then at his former homes, his office, his hangouts and even his horse's stall throughout the day.



Flowers were placed at various Wergeland monuments around town. Special outdoor theatrical performances honoured Wergeland's work, bakeries and cafés around town offered free treats to children, his poetry was read aloud and his efforts to support Norway's own constitution during the union with Sweden were hailed in numerous speeches.

It was Wergeland who agitated, and often got in trouble, for championing

celebrations of the constitution on the 17th of May. As a hard-partying young man, he led fellow students in celebrating the 17th of May in 1829 despite a prohibition laid down by the Swedish king at the time.

Wergeland is also well known for championing the rights of Jews in Norway, and he was a humanitarian who helped inspire the creation of Norway egalitarian state. Festivities were to continue throughout the day, highlighted by a parade from his statue downtown to another former

home, a party afterwards in the park around the Royal Palace, a concert at the Akershus Fortress where he had an office and a midnight celebration on the roof of the new Opera House at Bjørvika From *Aftenposten.no*

There are some new items added to their Family Search page that are unique and valuable for researchers. We hope to schedule some training on them. Persons eligible to attend are bygdelag members and others interested in Norwegian genealogy. We especially encourage lag genealogists and genealogy committee members to attend. The 2009 trek to SLC will be February 22nd—28th at the Plaza Hotel with a special room rate for \$82 for single or double and \$89 for triple or quad. The hotel is located next to the library so it is very handy.

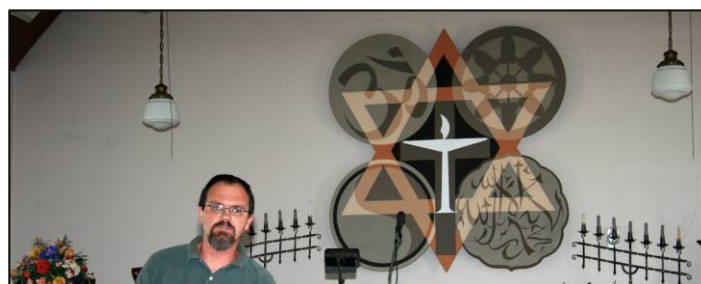

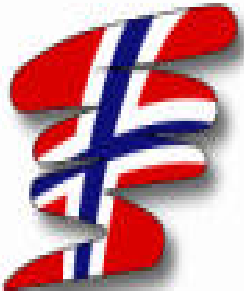
