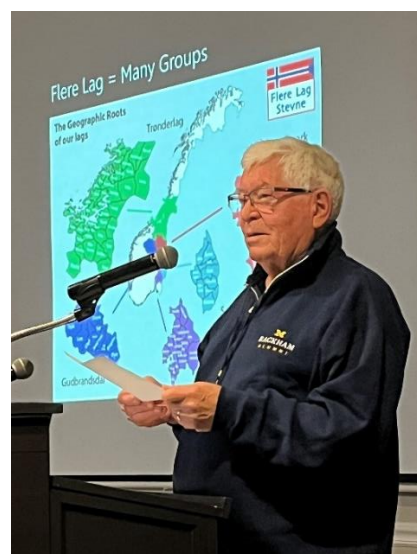

Though I haven't been in school for many years, in fall I restart projects (frequently genealogy related) and try to learn something new. The first Flere Lag Stevne, held in August, was a wonderful success. The merger of the Tre Lag Stevne lags, Romerikslaget and Solørlag brought together 147 participants in Rochester Minnesota. The schedule of events included all of our usual features – genealogy lab, tour of local Norwegian-American places, a good variety of presentations, banquet, vendor displays, and lag annual business meetings – which kept everyone busy. In addition, four mini-demos of research tools were presented throughout the first day of the stevne that was designated to genealogy. The silent auction was a new-to-us event that was a big hit. NHOH Lag came away with \$183 from the sale of donated items. Check out the stevne photos in this issue.

On October 15 Norway House held the grand opening of the new 'Innovation & Culture Center'. Queen Sonja of Norway participated in the ribbon cutting ceremony. (More detail is available on Norway House social media sites.) This space will eventually house a Bibliotek and Archive where some of

the NHOH Lag reference materials will be house. This fall we will be delivering several boxes of serial publications that will be available in the genealogy room when it opens in February 2023.

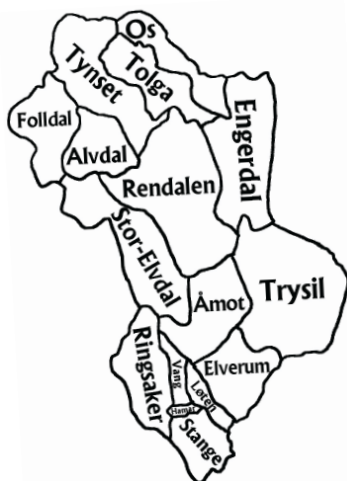

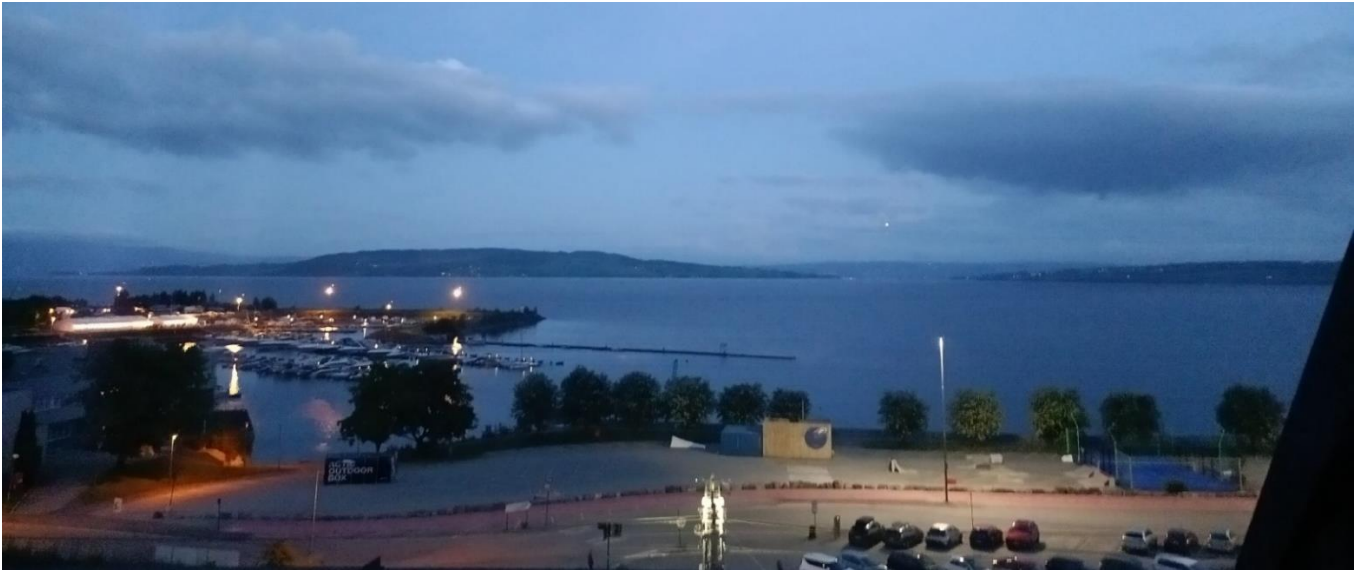

My Trip to Norway in June 2022 - Sharing Ancestral Locations & History Around Lake Mjøsa

My first "Middle of the Night" view of Lake Mjøsa, from our Victoria Hotel room window, in Hamar. Helgøya Island is seen left of center, Nes peninsula is at center-right edge of photo. Toten in Oppland, can be seen in the background, under the moon!

At my Facebook group/Norwegian Genealogy, in February 2019, I was asking about Skruen farm. I learned it had been abandoned & disappeared, just across the Nes border towards Ringsaker, near Revling. Geir Thorud knew of the farm and as the many comments & replies continued, I then learned he was my distant cousin! My 5x great-grandfather Ole Monsen Skjerven was Geir's 4x GGF's younger brother. Geir was extremely helpful, sharing look-ups & more family history, this far back in time. We were both thankful & relieved when we sorted out an error in Nes bygdebøk. We both questioned Mogen Svendsen Skruen & Eli Kristensdtr being my Ole's parents? (If they indeed had a son named Ole, then his details should be printed again, as replacements).

"What is your connection to Toten? Geir asked me. He then said, "I'm not really an expert on Toten, but have in 20 years worked with publications of transcribed sources for Toten. I may know a few people who'd share a bit more." Within a few days, Geir sent me a 17-page report; tracing the maternal lines of my 3x great-grandmother Agnethe Christensdtr. *She left Skjerven farm in April 1853, with her 4 youngest children. Below are scenic views, captured from our visit at Skjerven Farm.



Agnethe (1810/11?-1901) married Ole Olsen Skjerven (1803-1853?) at Nes in Dec 1830. Ole's parents moved here in 1795; Agnethe's maternal grandparents lived here from 1785 until 1793.



My cousins Vicki & Brent were on the deck with present resident Anna. (Her ancestral family took possession of the farm after our family moved to USA).

In March 2018, I was looking to see if our Maria Olsdtr (born at Skjerven in 1795) had a marriage record &/or family details shared with a man from Brøttum, Ringsaker. Eva McKenna lives on Helgøya and is one of the administrators at Facebook Group Nes og Helgøya Historielag. Eva confirmed my suspicion was correct! This Maria was married at Nes, baptized her first son there, then moved to raise her family on Havik/Havig farm in Brøttum. When Agnethe's husband emigrated from Nes in June 1850, with their eldest son Ole & their 2 eldest daughters, some of Maria's family left Norway with them.



My friend Eva also recently worked on the NEW EDITIONS of publishing the updated "ISLAND" bygdebøker. I wrote to her asking that she save me a complete set, being I was coming to Hedmark in June! From there, our months of planning took off. I shared Geir's report with Eva and she was looking forward to being our tour guide that weekend! "I brought a voice amplifier with me, so everyone in the back seat wouldn't miss a word!" Eva had friends on a few farms from our list and she was excited to set up many of our visits.

Agnethe and her husband Ole were 3rd cousins, once removed. Both had Wold farm in their backgrounds, through 2 sisters born over 300 years ago. Eva's friend Berit-Johanne lived on our family farm and had a fabulous handwritten tree & lots of family photos to show us. She set a pretty table & served us lefse, rolled up with brown cheese. Berit-Johanne's mother, to everyone's surprise, was related to our distant cousin Geir.

Our biggest heartfelt treasure, experienced on Helgøya, was our visit to Hovelsrud farm. There isn't enough room here to share, just how beautiful this place is. "We four-traveling cousins" shared 7 ancestral nights together - staying here, and then in Buskerud as well.

What you won't see on the above websites, is the building my ancestors lived in, when the 1801 census was taken on Maurud farm. Marianne Olsson has been restoring her family property, to what her ancestors once had. She's doing this now, for ours as well. She's previously bought & restored 3 Airbnb buildings. This will be her 4th property. Marianne mentioned modern conveniences & plumbing will likely be added to a lower, walk-out level to keep this structure true to its original character. Three generations of my ancestors had lived here!



We visited Svennerud farm, and saw a tribute to Peder Andersen Balke, born there in 1804. He went on to be a very celebrated Norwegian artist and painter, known for portraying the landscape of Norway in a romantic and dramatic manner.

Helene Hansdtr married Lars Nielsen at Nes in 1808. This record showed, she was then a worker on Svennerud farm. In May 1810, at the age of 24, Helene's husband drowned as a young dragoon soldier, living in Toten. Later that year in October, Helene married Christen Amundsen, in Faaberg. We visited Audenhus farm, where their daughter (Agnethe's younger sister) was born in 1815. *Please see photos and website tabs, shared on Audenhus Bed and Breakfast Facebook Page. My ancestor's moved to Toten for a few years,

before arriving at Maurud in 1825, where Agnethe was then confirmed.



I wasn't expecting to see anything, taking shape or form, inside Hovelsrud's barn; I thought all would be only in pieces. What a surprise, to find it all being put back together! Even the flower beams I photographed (here on the left) were set in place.

In the original loft, found amongst the sawdust, were these children's boots (seen to the right).

In Memorium

Carol A. Moore



Oshkosh - Carol A. (Mathewson) Moore. Carol died after a short battle with cancer on April 11, 2022. She was born on February 10, 1938 in Owen, WI to Virginia (Swanson) and Kenneth L. Mathewson.

Carol met who would later be her future husband, Frank B. Moore, when he started his teaching career in Owen where Carol's mother, Virginia, was an elementary teacher. Frank and Carol married on Thanksgiving Day in 1960.

Carol showed a love of art, music and literature from an early age. Her parents encouraged her with a piano and a violin. Carol was a voracious reader. In high school Carol taught herself the Norwegian art of Rosemaling. This continued for more than 60 years.

In 1995 Carol was awarded a Gold Medal from The Vesterheim Norwegian-American Museum for Rosemaling. She has her painting in museums around the world and has been featured in 3 books, the most recent from Japan.

Carol spent her life as an educator. She began as a kindergarten teacher and later worked as the Adult Education Coordinator for FVTC. She began teaching Rosemaling in 1974 and continued to teach full time for the next 25 years. She retired from instruction in 1999 to care for her mother.

Carol was an avid historian and genealogist. She traced both her and her husband's family to the American Revolution, the Mayflower and centuries beyond. As a result of her research, Carol was a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution and the Mayflower Society. She was also a member of the Order of the Eastern Star. Her family had a strong Masonic tradition. Carol was a member of Faith United Methodist Church for many years where she was also a member of the choir.

Carol was predeceased by her husband, Frank B. Moore, her parents, her in laws, a granddaughter, son-in-law, two brothers-in-law, and a sister-in-law. She is survived by her children, grandchildren, brother, nieces, nephews and many others.

There was a private funeral service for family in Oshkosh. Burial was at Riverside Cemetery in Withee, WI.

Dennis L. Amb, age 80, of Lansing, IL passed away Friday, October 16, 2020. He was born in Devil's Lake, North Dakota, on February, 9, 1940, to John Oscar Amb, Sr. and Mabel Bjerke.

The family relocated when he was young, and he grew up in Marysville, WA. He attended the University of Washington as part of the Naval ROTC program. After earning his degree in physics, he was on active duty with the United States Navy from 1962 – 1966, serving aboard the USS Renville (APA-227) in the Engineering Department, as well as on several naval bases. While on ship's liberty in San Diego in 1962, he met Rosemary Dolores Anderson. They married May 15, 1963. After the Navy, Dennis worked for the General Electric Company, relocating the family to the Chicago area in late 1967. He retired from GE in 2000, after working over 30 years as a field engineer, with broad knowledge of mechanical, nuclear, electrical and computer engineering, as well as computer science. He also earned an MBA from Purdue, while working full time. Coming full circle back to ships, one of his last major jobs for GE was developing computer subsystems for several major cruise lines. After retirement, he traveled, enjoyed reading science fiction, astronomy and technical books, watched British mystery series on PBS, worked on his family genealogy, and volunteered with AARP, to help other seniors file their tax returns. He was a loving father, and patient devoted husband, tenderly caring for his ailing wife, Rose.

Dennis is survived by his wife, Rosemary D. Amb, daughter Victoria Elaine "Vikki" (Jeff) Lesniak of Ellicott City, MD, brother John O. Amb, Jr., of Vancouver, WA, and many nieces, nephews, and cousins.

He was preceded in death by his brothers Richard and Norris Amb, and sisters Joyce Roberson and Mildred Johnson.

Norwegian Recipes

Seven cookies for Christmas (syv slags kaker)

Recipes provided by Julie Anderson Glowka, unless otherwise noted

Seven cookies for Christmas has a long tradition in Scandinavia. Although, Norwegians don't agree on exactly which cookies should be included, they all include recipes rich in butter and sugar.

Here are a few that you might be familiar with. Some of the recipes date back to my grandmother and some are newer additions. A few of the recipes have been shared by other bakers.

Goro

3 cups butter
3 eggs
1 ½ cups heavy whipping cream
1 ½ cups sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1 teaspoon cardamom
9 cups flour

Beat the eggs and sugar completely. Add the whipping cream, vanilla and cardamom. Stir in the butter and flour alternately. Save some flour for rolling out. Refrigerate overnight. Roll out as thin as possible. Cut a paper or cardboard pattern the size and shape of the goro iron. Place the pattern on the rolled-out dough and cut cookies around it. Turn the iron over regularly so the cookies brown evenly. Cook until golden brown. Trim the edges immediately. Remove from iron and cut the cookies into thirds along the lines marked by the iron.



Krumkake

6 eggs, beat well
1 cup melted butter
1 cup sugar
2 cups flour
1 ½ tsp. cardamom

Melt butter. Add sugar gradually. Add well beaten eggs, then mix in flour and cardamom.

Pour by spoonful onto hot, buttered krumkake iron. Cook until light brown. Remove from iron and immediately roll over cone shaped form.

Sandbakkels

Recipe provided by Jeri Johnson

1 cup butter
1 cup margarine
1 cup sugar
6 tablespoons whipping cream
1 tablespoon brandy (or brandy flavoring)
(I use 1½ tsp almond extract and 1 tsp vanilla instead)
1 egg
6 cups flour

Cream butter, margarine, and sugar. Add cream, flavorings, and egg. Slowly add flour until well mixed. Chill slightly. When cook roll into small balls. Press into tins and keep pressing until thin layer covers bottom and sides. Trim off excess from edges. Bake at 350 degrees until light golden in color. Makes 5 dozen.

Spritz

1 ½ cups butter
1 cup sugar
1 egg
2 tablespoons milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
½ teaspoon almond extract
4 cups sifted flour
1 tsp baking powder

Heat oven to 400°. Thoroughly cream butter and sugar. Add egg, milk, vanilla and almond extract. Beat well. Sift flour and baking powder. Add gradually to creamed mixture. Mix until smooth. DO NOT CHILL. Put through cookie press to form into wreaths, trees, hearts, stars etc. Bake on ungreased cookie sheet for 8 minutes. Cool on rack.

Rosettes

1 cup sifted flour
1 cup milk
1 egg
1 to 2 teaspoons sugar
¼ teaspoon salt
Sufficient oil for deep frying
1 cup powdered sugar

Batter should be prepared 1 hour in advance and refrigerated. Beat flour, milk, egg, sugar and salt with beater until smooth. Place iron in deep fry pan with cold oil and heat slowly to 370°. Keep heat as steady as possible during frying. Coat 7/8 of the mold in batter. Plunge mold immediately into hot oil. After a few second pry rosette off and continue frying. Fry a few seconds on both sides until golden brown. Remove rosette from oil with fork. Let excess fat drip off and set on paper towel. Sprinkle with powdered sugar.

Fattigmann

Recipe provided by Mietek Glowka

5 egg yolks
½ teaspoon salt
3 tablespoons sugar
1 tablespoon rum
5 tablespoons sour cream
2 ½ cups flour
Powdered sugar for dusting

Add salt to eggs and beat until thick and lemon colored. Add sugar and rum and beat until well blended. Add sour cream and flour alternately mixing well with each addition. Knead on floured board until the dough blisters. Cut in halves, roll very thin and cut into strips about 4 inches long. Slit each piece in center and pull one end through the slit. Fry in hot fat until lightly browned. Drain on absorbent paper towel and sprinkle with powdered sugar.

Pepperkaker

Recipe provided by Anne Hillgren Haugan

½ cup shortening
½ cup molasses
½ cup sugar
½ tablespoon vinegar
1 beaten egg
3 cups flour
½ teaspoon cinnamon
½ teaspoon baking soda
½ teaspoon salt

Sift together flour, cinnamon, baking soda and salt. Set aside. Add shortening, molasses, sugar and vinegar to a saucepan and bring to boil. Remove from heat and when cool add beaten egg. Add the sifted ingredients and mix well.

Chill dough. Using a little flour, roll out the dough fairly thin.

Cut out shapes (size 5" to 6") and bake at 325° for 15 to 18 minutes. For larger shapes (size 6" to 10") bake at 375° for 15 to 18 minutes. Depending on your oven, times may need to be adjusted.
