# Fra Presidenten

Hilsen fra Presidenten

Since its June, it's time to make reservations for the 2025 Flere Lag Stevne in August. The program and registration form are included in this issue

In recognition of the 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the first organized group of Norwegian immigrants who arrived in New York on the ship Restauration in October 1825, this year's theme is "New Land, New Life: 1825-2025". The stevne planning committee has, again, put together a strong program. Tuesday focuses on genealogy, with three mini-demos of genealogy tools and tips, a workshop by Elaine Hasleton on researching Finnish ancestors in Norway, and a class for beginners in the evening. Seven presentations on Wednesday and Thursday concentrate on the emigration process (why they left; travel on ships, who came to the La Crosse area), and social customs and things important to new settlers (establishing churches; marriage; farming).

There is a major change from our previous stevne schedule to be aware of. The tour, which will be to Norskedalen Nature and Heritage Park, will be on Wednesday afternoon and evening instead of Friday. To take advantage of a concert being held the evening of August 6, we will tour Norskedalen in the late afternoon, have a catered dinner in the pavilion, and stay for the concert. This cuts into the time available for speaker presentations.

Due to the cost of renting the conference center rooms at the hotel, it was decided not to have any speakers on Friday morning. The NHOH Lag Annual Membership Meeting is the only thing on the schedule on Friday August 8 at 8:30AM.

# A Magical Moment from my Attendance at the First Meeting of NHOH Lag By Dixie Hansen

In August 1995, I attended the founding meeting of the Nord Hedmark og Hedemarken Lag in Madison, Wisconsin. One of the many scheduled activities was for participants to break out into smaller discussion groups with others whose ancestors came from the same kommuner in Hedmark. I gathered with the group who had ancestry in Alvdal.

As an icebreaker, we went around the circle of chairs and introduced ourselves and explained what our family connection was to Alvdal. When my turn arrived, I said that it was initially complicated for me to make sense of my paternal Grandmother's Norwegian origins because of **NAME CHANGES**.

I told the group that the Grandmother I grew up knowing only as "Grandma Wick" had gone through so many name changes in her lifetime that figuring it all out had me tied up in knots for a while:

Grandma Wick was born in Alvdal (then called Lille Elvedalen) Norway in 1887 and was given the name of Marit Tobiasdatter Steivang. (Tobiasdatter was her patronymic name and Steivang was the name of the little farm on which she was born and was also the "surname" she was listed by in her grade school records). When Grandma immigrated to the US in 1902, her brother Embret Tobiassen (AKA Andrew Thompson), who had come before her, told her to follow her lead and choose a more American name. She obeyed and swapped "Marit Tobiasdatter" to "May Thompson." No legal documents were involved, since name changes could be made quite casually back then. In the early 1900 US records, I can see that "May Thompson" is the name she was listed by when she sponsored the baptisms of a couple of her nieces and nephews in Stanley, Wisconsin. In 1910 May Thompson married my Grandfather, Alfred Hansen, and so became "May Hansen." Grandpa Hansen died young (in his early 40s) in 1922. In 1934, Grandma married my Step-Grandfather, Fred Solberg Wick. And thus, she became "May Wick."

After this convoluted recounting, I recapped things for the Alvdal break-out group by saying that my Grandmother's full suite of names was **Marit Tobiasdatter Steivang May Thompson Hansen Wick**.

I thought I might have lost them all with my long-winded explanation... but another member of the group, Roslyn (Hogenson) Wadell, caught my arm immediately after we broke up and excitedly said "I know who May Wick is...and there is a picture of her in my photo album with my Great Aunt Christina!"

Roslyn and I compared family trees and figured out that my Grandma Wick and her Great Aunt Christina were 2<sup>nd</sup> cousins. Christina's parents immigrated to the US in the early 1870s and Christina was born in Wisconsin in 1879. So the 2 young 2<sup>nd</sup> cousins didn't' meet each other until Grandma arrived in 1902. They subsequently became good friends and, as young women, left Wisconsin and travelled together to Minnesota to find work in the downtown Minneapolis boarding houses.

Roslyn (Hogenson) Waddell (who, it turned out was, the mother of NHOH's current President, Joy Shong) subsequently sent me a copy of a wonderful photo of Tobine Steivang (Grandma's sister), Christina Hogenson, and May....)

# Commemorating 200 Years Since the Beginning of Mass Migration of Norwegians to America

As a board member of the Norwegian American Club of Maryland I was invited to the Washington D.C. Residence and Gardens of the Ambassador of Norway for a Commemoration of 200 Years of Norwegians in America.

This 7 May 2025 event included:

Welcoming remarks from Norway's Ambassador to the U.S., Her Excellency Anniken Huitfeldt and Norway's Defense Attaché to the U.S., Rear Admiral Ole Morten Sandquist.





Performances by His Majesty the King's Guard Band and Drill Team and The United States Army Old Guard Fife and Drum Corps



The event was attended by a few hundred people including US and Foreign Military in uniform and diplomats from several other Washington D.C. embassies.

As I reached the top of the stairs in the Ambassador's Residence the Ambassador greeted me and said she liked my tie which has the colors of the Norwegian Flag. I looked around a few of the rooms in the residence and then headed to the gardens. There were two open bars serving, beer, wine, and of course aquavit. A long buffet table offered many typical Norwegian foods. Members of the King's Guard were servers and one was making Norwegian heart-shaped waffles.

In her remarks Ambassador Huitfeldt related that when she first met Secretary Pete Hegseth in the White House he told her he had Norwegian ancestors. She had his ancestry researched and later presented it to him. It turns out all of Pete's ancestors are Norwegian. (Note: Pete Hegseth grew up in Forest Lake, Minnesota)

Ambassador Huitfeldt invited Secretary Hegseth to this commemoration event where he also laid a wreath for Victory in Europe Day, May 8<sup>th</sup>, in memory of those who lost their lives liberating Europe in World War II.



I hope to be invited to many more events at the Norwegian Embassy.

## 2025 Stevne Tour - Norskedalen

This year's tour will be a visit to Norskedalen or Norwegian Valley and includes the Bekkum Homestead, Thrunegaarden and the Thrune Visitor Center and Museum.

The Bekkum homestead strives to replicate an immigrant farm and includes original building moved from neighboring farms.

The Thrune farm includes a house built in 1853 and considered to be the oldest surviving house in the area.

The two museum galleries focus on "The Immigrant Story" and the importance of folk art and music to immigrants and their families.

# The history of my great great grandfather, Erick Steien, using nontraditional resources and pictures

While researching my Norwegian great great grandfather. Erick Steien, I wanted to learn more about his life. and show that he was more than a listing of dates and places.

Erick SyverssonTøfthaugen was born in Folldal, Norway on January 27, 1845.

\*The Bygdebok for Folldal, Gard og Aett, Bind II" is a great resource in listing information on the Tøfthaugen farm in Folldal where Erick and all his siblings were born. Erick was one of 10 children born to Syver Oleson and Marit Larsdatter Tøfthaugen. It is interesting to note that all 10 children lived to adulthood and no siblings died during infancy.

Erick immigrated to America in May 1871.

The oldest picture we have of Erick was taken in Chicago, Illinois with his three brothers after his brother, John Wirum arrived in America in 1874.



#### G.nr. 139 b.nr. 9 Tøfthaugen

Garden ligg like ved Tøftan og har namnet frå denne, men er utskild frå Hovde (139-6). Skylddelt 10. oktober 1873, men det budde folk her lenge før den tid som husmenn. Den første ein har greie på, er Ole Syverson. Han og kona skriv seg begge for Hjerkinn i 1800 da dei gifter seg, og Ole er tenestekar der. I 1801 finn ein ikkje Ole Syverson i folketellinga, men kona Marit Jensd. bur i Børsungseter (228-2) saman med første datter si og er tenestejente hjå Johannes Pederson, som er onkelen hennar. Det er uvisst kva tid Ole og Marit fløtte til Tøft-

Sonen Syver overtok først, og sia vart dattera Marit gift med brukaren etter Syver. Syver er husmann med jord i 1865. Marit og mannen Gunder budde først i Rydningsøyen (Øyasetra 152-2), men kom til Tøfthaugen i 1865, og Gunder nemnes da sjøleigar. Dei hadde sonen Eirik som sto som eigar i 1873. Eirik fekk skjøte på Månrønningen (Rydningen) i Alvdal 1872. Han hadde postkøyringa, først mellom Tynset, Alvdal og Folldal, seinare berre mellom Alvdal og Folldal. Han vart kalla Post-Erek. I 1880-åra reiste familien til Amerika. Eirik Gunderson ga 14. juni 1881 skjøte til Ingebrigt Tøftan, og han att leverte med skjøte 15. februar 1893 til Anders Guttormson Dalløkken. Han var gruvearbeidar i Rennebu 1875, så jernbanearbeidar i Alvdal og budde på Høyeggen. Han fløtte så til Tøfthaugen, var baneformann og hadde pensjon av staten.

Yngste datter til Anders, Gustava, vart gift til Lohn, men mannen hennar omkom ved ulykke i gruva. Ho vart eigar av Tøfthaugen ifølge skifteskjøte 15. desember 1920, og sonen hennar, Arvid, overtok med skjøte 10. juli 1948. Eigar i dag er dattera hans, Anne-Mari Voll, som fekk skjøte 5. mai 1980.

\*Photo identification - four brothers' last names were: Wirum, Steien (the original spelling) and Stein.

Erick married "Carrie" Karen Christ on October 25, 1874 in Stockholm, Wisconsin. They met each other while living in Stockholm, and attending the Sabylund Lutheran Church there.

\*The first picture I could find of Erick and Karen was taken in 1881 with the son, Sam Steien.

Erick was very religious and his own handwriting in his Bible attested to his deep faith.

Translation of Erick's Bible, by his daughter, Mary Steien Nihart:

This book is bought for \$1.25 for me, "Erik" Syverson. I was born into this world the 27th of January in 1845. God is the same yesterday and today and is like forever.

My wife, Caren, Sven's daughter, was born the 15th of November



1859. God's holy name be praised both now and forever. Amen.

My daughter Julia was born into this world the 11th of November in 1874 and died the 12th of November in the same year. God gave and God took away. God's name be praised.

God let my daughter Edda Maria see this world's light the 3rd of March and she departed by death the 15th of March in 1876. All things are for the good that love Him.

On the 28th of March in 1877, Praise the Lord God almighty, our son Samuel Edward saw the light of this world. Jesus is my friend, the best which has never been seen before.

Our son Olaf Ludwig was born into this world the 2nd of July in 1880 and died in September of the same year.

Our dear, dear loving son Reuben Wilson was born into this world the 22nd of December in 1883 and died the 21st of October in 1884.

Lucy Caroline was born the 14th of December in 1888.

Mary Emily was born the 4th of September in 1893.

The Steien family lived on the South Bluff in rural Stockholm, Wisconsin. They had a modest house that this family lived in and their three children were raised in.

After his wife passed away, Erick's son Sam built him a small home which was placed near the Sam Steien house. This was the house that Erick was living in when he passed away. After Erick's death, this house was moved across the street and became the milk house on the Amelia and Emil Johnson farm. Amelia was a half-sister to his wife.

Erick was born January 27, 1845, on the Tøfthaugen farm in Folldal, Norway to Syver and Mait (Larsdatter) Syverson. He had a home christening the same day of his birth.

Erick lived and worked near the city center of Alvdal, Norway called "Steien", and it is thus we got our name when he came to America.

Erick arrived in New York from the Alvdal (Lille Elvedal) parish in Folldal, Norway in June of 1871.

"Carrie" Karen Christ Moen was born on November 15, 1859, on the Moen farm in Setskog, Norway to Maren Oline Hansdatter and Swen Christianson Moen.

On October 25, 1874, Erick and Karen were married in Stockholm, WI. Eric was 29 years old and Karen was 14 years old. Their daughter, Mary Steien Nihart talks about Karen having a "wasps waist" when she got married. Eric was able to fit both his hands around her waist. Erick and Karen had seven children of whom only three survived. Although they suffered many losses, they still had a great devotion and were very religious. The transcriptions in Erick's bible attests to his deep faith. After the death of their daughter Julia, he wrote: "God gave and God took away. God's name be praised." After their daughter Edda Maria died, he wrote: "All things are for the good that love Him."

Erick and Karen had their home on the South Bluff of Stockholm, WI.

In a tax assessment in 1884, it is interesting to note the following property of Erick and Karen: 40 acres valued at \$100, 2 horses valued at \$70, 2 cattle valued at \$18, 2 swine valued at \$3, 1 wagon valued at \$10 and all other property valued at \$25.

Karen had pleurisy which turned into T.B. because she would not go see a doctor. On April 22, 1905, Karen died of pulmonary T.B. She was buried in the Old Sabylund Cemetery during Holy Week. Their daughter Lucy helped raise her sister, Mary after Karen died. Lucy didn't know how to cook or sew when her mother died. Erick taught his daughter, Lucy, to cook and Lucy taught herself to sew.

Years later, Erick had a house built next to his son, Samuel and Agnes Steiens' house. Samuel's sons,

Harold and Clarence Stein helped Samuel build the house. The home Eric lived in became the milk-house to the barn Amelia and Emil Johnson farm, which later became the Wayne Rundquist farm in Stockholm, WI.

The Samuel Steien children would play tricks on their grandfather by knocking on the front door and running to hide. As an aged man it took him a while to get to the door to find that nobody was there. The children also thought it was so fun to run by his house and scrape a stick against the side of the house. They remember the floor in his house was painted a bright orange.

Erick dearly loved his wife. When he died on September 17, 1927, of heart failure while working in the fields, Karen's wedding band, in it's original box, was found in his pocket. Erick is buried next to his beloved wife in the Old Sabylund Cemetery.

Erick and Carrie's final resting place in the Old Sabylund Cemetery. grave is the grave for Carrie's father, Sven and her step-mother Marion.



Although the Old Sabylund Church is not standing anymore, I was able to find a picture of the Old Sabylund Church that was printed in a church history book. The site of the church is currently a newer cement block tool shed in the cemetery.



Recently <u>ancestry.com</u> has been scanning and uploading wills and documents in settling an estate.


I was able to find Erick's will with his signature, a newspaper probate clipping and the expenses for Erick's funeral.



# Peter (Pete) Christianson

Peter "Pete" Christianson, Major US Army Retired, passed away peacefully at ThedaCare Regional Medical Center in Neenah, WI, on February 16, 2025, at the age of 81 years. Pete was born on May 22, 1943, in Neenah, WI, the son of Palmer and Kathryn Christianson. He attended the

one-room Royer School and graduated from Winneconne High School. While attending the University of Wisconsin – Madison, Peter met and subsequently married Karen (Cademartori) Christianson on January 20, 1965. After the passing of Karen, Pete met Susan Mokler of Ripon, WI, in February 2018. The two were engaged to be married at the time of Pete's passing.

Pete took advantage of an Army Nurse development program while at the University of Wisconsin and upon graduation was commissioned as an officer in the United States Army. After receiving his initial training in Denver, CO, he was deployed to Japan where he served as a psychiatric nurse for three years. Upon completing that tour of duty, he returned to the United States and completed the Nursing Advanced Course in San Antonio, TX. He then went on to duty assignments at Fort Benning, GA; Washington, DC; Landstuhl, Germany; and Fort Sheridan, IL. Peter retired from the Army as a Major after 20 years of service. Pete finished his professional career working as a psychiatric nurse from 1983 to 1997 with Winnebago County Mental Health Clinic.

Pete was a very active member of many communities. Pete served as a Scout master for Boy Scout troop in Germany. Along with Karen, he hosted a foreign exchange student and organized numerous lobster feed fund raisers at Winneconne High School. Pete joined the Larsen-Winchester Lions Club in 2002, where he assisted with ramp building and pancake breakfasts. Peter ran the Larsen-Winchester Lion's Medical Locker. Many a person in need spoke to Pete, seeking information on the Lion's locker. Pete received honors as a Lion of the Year in 2022, Melvin

Jones Fellow, the Birch-Sturm Award and the Knight of Sight Award. Because of his love of history and genealogy, Pete served in multiple capacities with the Winchester Area Historical Society and also served as the Vice-President of the Totenlag (Norwegian Genealogical Group).

Pete's hobbies included skiing, travel, camping, genealogy, woodworking, and researching local history. Pete wrote hundreds of articles for the Winneconne News covering nature, local history, and Wisconsin lore.

Pete was predeceased by Karen Cademartori Christianson, his loving wife of 51 years.

He is lovingly remembered by his sons, Peter (Mary), Tim (Lori), and Joe (Jen); his fiancée, Sue Mokler; his brother, Barry (Janine) Christianson; his sister, Coral (Dick) Anderson; his sister-in-law, Kathryn (Steven) Schweighardt, his brothers-in-law, Kevin (Lorin) Cademartori and Melvin Mathison; and grandchildren, Nathaniel, Robert, Brianna, and Alyssa.

Pete now takes his place in history along with his sisters, Ruth Christianson, Laura Friedrich, and Adele Mathison; his sister-in-law, Susan Christianson; his niece, Laurie Puetz; his brother-in-law, Steve Friedrich; his parents, Palmer and Kathryn Christianson; and his parents-in-law, Joseph and Anne Cademartori.
